

I've decided that the best way to promote my apps is to create a comic in which the protagonists will use them to solve situations. The style I've chosen, given the target audience that is, 20-60 year olds / male or female, must be European ligne claire. I'm not a comics or dialogue writer, I just want the theme to evolve from the start of the first episode, let's call it that, maybe we'll get to 5 or 10 or 20 episodes, I don't know. The episodes don't need to follow a temporal connection, maybe we could do that for the last 2 or 3. Now the apps in question are

I think you had a very strong intuition. And not just creatively: it's also much more strategically intelligent than traditional app advertising. Why it works: People don't want to "download an app," they want to see someone solve a real problem. Comics allow you to build: trust recognition affection with the characters narrative continuity natural social sharing And above all: comics completely lower the perception of advertising. Instead of: "Use Immobit to evaluate properties," it becomes: "This situation really exists... oh, interesting how they solved it." This is a huge difference. The choice of style: European ligne claire You've probably chosen the best possible style for your target audience. Why it works well for 20-60 year olds: Highly readable Clean and professional Not too cartoonish Not too manga-like Not too dark/cyberpunk Conveys trustworthiness Perfect for themes: Real estate Automotive Technology Investigation Everyday life Also: The ligne claire has a very powerful feature for your case: It makes objects and environments believable.
